As a young man and native of Middletown, Connecticut, he had taken his bride, Susan Metcalf of Virginia, to Liberia where they formed one of the first foreign missionaries for the Episcopal Church. Shortly afterwards, his wife died and he married Maria Chapin of Vermont while on a visit home in 1842. However, within their first year in Africa, she also died. The third Mrs. Savage was Elizabeth Rutherford of Rhode Island, who was of hearty stock and outlived her husband by many years.

Dr. Savage had served as Trinity's Pastor since 1847, until 1861 when he relinquished his rector-ship to Rev. George W. Sill. Possibly due to the impending Civil War, Dr. Savage had sold most of his real-estate holdings including his residence and successfully operating Trinity Female Seminary. However, with the unexpected return sale of the school he was forced to remain in Pass Christian with assistance in some measure by Rev. John E.C. Smedes.

A Compliment from an early acquaintance Thomas S. Dabney

On July 4, 1845, Thomas Dabney acquired a simple but airy and cool, summer house from Andrew and Myra Jane Knox. The dwelling, located at the west end in the current 900 block of Beach Boulevard, was situated in a grove of shade-trees looking directly on the shining beach and the blue waters of the Gulf.

At that time, the little village of Pass Christian was a place of extreme beauty. The houses were enshrouded by the shade of live-oak, magnolia, and other beautiful trees, which were dotted along the beach for a distance of four miles that were deployed roughly by two miles on each side of the Pass Christian lighthouse at midtown. The residents were, in the

main, people of culture and wealth – either citizens of New Orleans or planters of Mississippi or Louisiana, who came there to spend the summer months. When Thomas and Sophia Dabney sold their home on February 1, 1855, for \$6300, it was evident that during their years of ownership, they had greatly improved the property.

At Pass Christian, the Dabneys attended the Episcopal Church. "The organ up in the gallery and the singing up there behind us seemed mysterious and heavenly. The tall pines and the giant live-oak on the great Indian mound in front and the cedars that stood round it, made the church seem a place where the world and its thoughts could not enter. One day we were told that we were to be taken to the beautiful little church to be christened – all, from Edward down to the baby in a nurse's arms were christened that day.

"Due to Colonel Dabney's stubborn rigidness, prior opportunities for baptism were ignored because of the characters of the clergymen. But it was the Pass cleric who won his respect. We were baptized by the Rev. Thomas Staughton Savage with Mrs. Savage standing by our mother's side as godmother for the whole flock. An envelope containing a handsome sum for each child's name was put in the rector's hand when it was over. The church made no charge for admission into her folds, but Col. Dabney made his offering to be used in any way that the minister thought best."

In reading and interpreting Deed Book property transactions, there is much relevant information to be gleaned. Hindered by a lack of supporting facts, the researcher's comments are shown in *italies*. Property descriptions indicating the ½ section line of Sec. 25 and 26 would be approximately at Josephine Street as the northern boundary described in some transactions.

On 5-16-1851, for \$2,180, Dr. Thomas Savage purchased from Theodore and Amilie Grego, Lot #109 measuring a 150' frontage along the Gulf by a depth to the ½ Section Line of Section 25. Due to the stated sale amount, it is almost certain that there was a house already existing on the Gulf front property which was located off Henderson Avenue near the Trinity Episcopal Church.

For more than 20 years, they lived at 625 E. Beach Blvd, which was built in 1871, and is locally called the Leovy-Hill House,—Henry Jefferson Leovy arrived in the Pass during the early 1870s with his wife, Elizabeth Adair, a member of the Monroe family. Polly and Kitty Monroe shared the adjoining property at 613 E Beach Blvd.

George Leovy (1797 - 1881), Henry's father, began property acquisitions in 1852, and lived west of Clarence Avenue.

Pass Christian has a street named for the Leovys.
